Jurisdiction	Deadlines	Defense of Payment	Notes
<b>Virginia</b>	<p><b>Mechanic's Lien Notice:</b> All contractors must file Lien in land records within 90 days from the last day of the month in which the Claimant last performs work; but not later than 90 days from completion of the entire project. A Lien cannot claim amounts for work done more than 150 days prior to the date of last work.</p> <p><b>Complaint to Enforce Mechanic's Lien (lawsuit):</b> Must be filed within six months from the date the mechanic's lien is filed.</p>	<p><b>Yes.</b> All contractors must serve notice of lien on owner and upstream contractors while they are still holding enough money to cover lien.</p>	<p>* All contractors must provide an additional notice to Mechanic's Lien Agent on residential projects within 30 days of <u>beginning</u> work.</p> <p>* Liens for on and off-site development improvements available.</p>
<b>Maryland</b>	<p><b>Notice of Intent to Lien:</b> Subcontractors must serve Notice on owner within 120 days of last work.</p> <p><b>Petition to Establish Lien (lawsuit):</b> All contractors must file within 180 days from last work.</p>	<p><b>No.</b> Owner must make sure all subs have been paid, except where an individual builds a single family dwelling for own residence on own land.</p>	<p>* Sale of property to bona fide purchaser extinguishes lien rights.</p> <p>* General contract must improve building to 15% of its value (25% on tenant work).</p> <p>* Liens for some site work available.</p>
<b>District of Columbia</b>	<p><b>Notice of Mechanic's Lien:</b> All contractors must file in land records within 90 days of completion or termination of project.</p> <p><b>Complaint Enforcing Lien (lawsuit):</b> Within 180 days after filing of Notice of Mechanic's Lien in land records or from the date of completion of the project. Must also file a "notice of pendency of action" in land records within 10 days of filing lawsuit.</p>	<p><b>Yes (see VA. Above).</b> Sub has right to request general contract terms and status of account from owner.</p>	<p>* Must present license and certificate of good standing to file lien.</p> <p>* No sub-subcontractor lien rights.</p> <p>* Subcontractors must also serve notice of lien on owner.</p>
<b>Pennsylvania</b>	<p><b>Formal Notice:</b> All subcontractors must serve a Formal Notice on owner at least 30 days before filing lien claim.</p> <p><b>Lien Claim:</b> All contractors must file in prothonotary's (court clerk's) office within 6 months of last work and serve notice of the lien claim on owner within one month after that.</p> <p><b>Complaint to Enforce (lawsuit):</b> Within two years of lien filing.</p>	<p><b>No.</b> Owner must make sure all subcontractors have been paid.</p> <p><b>Yes.</b> Owner can create a defense of payment by recording the general contract.</p>	<p>* General Contractor can file stipulation against liens with court, before project begins waiving all subcontractor mechanic's lien rights only on residential projects if general contract under \$1,000,000.</p>

Count your deadline from the date of last SUBSTANTIAL and NEW WORK. Trivial items, repairs, and warranty work may not extend your deadline.
